I recently went to a talk about Cantley Sugar Factory and I thought members might be interested in the content:

The speaker was Steve Cash, who joined British Sugar in 1970 and worked at Cantley from the 1980's. He is now the archivist for British Sugar. His talk and photos mostly covered the social aspects of sugar production.

By 16th century crystal sugar was made from sugar cane grown in southern Europe and then in the West Indies. It was very expensive. Poorer people had to make do with molasses found at the bottom of imported barrels of sugar, hence the expression '*scraping the barrel*'. Alexander the Great is said to have chewed on sugar cane before a battle.

In 1747 Andreas Marggraf, a German chemist, isolated sugar from Beta Maritima (sea beet). In 1801 Franz Achard, experimented with other beets, and found sugar beet to contain the most sugar. Selective breeding has improved the beet and yield to the levels we have today. However, it was not until the Napoleonic wars when the British Navy blockaded French ports impeding the importation of sugar, that beet was grown for sugar production in Northern Europe. In 1811 the French started to plant large quantities of beet and small factories were built. By the end of the 1880's beet sugar had replaced cane in Europe. However, because of Britain's sugar production in the colonies, and reluctance of farmers to grow beet, it had not taken off here. By the early 20th Century, it was decided that strategically and to add beet into the crop rotation cycle, beet should be grown in Britain. Joannes van Rossum, was growing beet in the Netherlands, and saw the commercial opportunity of growing in East Anglia. Firstly, he grew the beet here and it was processed in his factory in the Netherlands. The Anglo Netherlands Sugar Corporation was born and a factory site was selected for the UK. Cantley was chosen as a good site with the rail station, River Yare and adequate road connections.

In March 1912 construction of the factory at Cantley was started and finished by November despite the flooding that year. A Norwich company, Hobrough and Sons, constructed the steel frame and machinery came from Dordrecht Sugar Factory in the Netherlands. Some migrant labour was used both on the land and in the factory. Coal, construction materials and sugar beet were delivered by rail, river (wherries until 1960's), and road. Production stopped during WW1 and the factory started to operate again in 1922 as 'The English Beet Sugar Corporation. In1938 the Sugar act amalgamated factories and subsidized sugar production.

Coal was required in large quantities for processing the beet, although gas has now been connected to the plant. The iconic high chimneys with steam belching forth during 'the campaign' from October to March has been a feature of the landscape for decades. Although the beet is still sliced and sugar processed at Cantley, the 'steam' has been absent for

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the last couple of years as animal feed, a by-product from the beet, is no longer processed and dried at Cantley. The factory is automated now and employs few people compared to the estimated 600 when set up in 1912.

The Rigging Out Supper was held on Saturday 6th April. Twenty eight members met at Surlingham Village Hall for the clubs traditional 'tasty' bring a plate and share evening. After quick introductions all enjoyed a great selection of hot and cold mains and sweets provided by members.

Followed this year by a version of TV's 1% quiz with logic type questions quiz prepared by Race Officer Ben Adams. The 'obligatory' raffle not being held this year instead a Bring and Sell. Various items, including outside lights, a TV and numerous books and trinket being donated by club members with all proceeds going to club funds.

Sailing Section

Race 1 – First of the Local racing

Racing recommenced for 2024 on Sunday 7th April. With cold strong winds blowing many members were put off but four Yeomans and one Wayfarer came to the line for the first race. Prior to the start a strong gust blew through and *Kingfisher* decided to err on the side of caution and retired leaving just the four boats to cross the start line for the first race. OOD's Dave & Margaret Woolston assisted by Dave Durrant set a course of just two buoys.

OOD Dave Woolston set a fairly long course with buoys placed well up and down stream. The strong winds though made for some tough sailing conditions particularly on the start line and Paul and Gill in the sole Wayfarer had a fight on their hands to successfully stay upright., it was definitely Yeoman weather. John and Sandy Wells in Diamond Lil, sailing in conditions they enjoy, managed to take first place in all three races with Dave Tait and Will in Trio competing with Ben and Crispin in Felspar to take second places. Paul Parker and Gill Westwood in the Wayfarer managing to grab a very creditable third place in the second race. A full list of results and photos are on the club website.



Race 2 – 1st Downriver race

The first downriver race took place on 14th April., OOD's Mike & Shirley Roll and Dave Greenacre, set the long course to the stile just short of Langley Woods, fair weather with lovely winds of 18mph form the southwest brought 8 Yeomans to the line.

Millchic and *Kingfisher* got away to a good start with *Felspar* hard on their tail, the rest of the fleet trailing not far behind. Passing Buckenham, *Kingfisher* took the lead followed closely by *Felspar* and with *Bluey* chasing hard and slowly gaining ground.

Positions remained the same at the turning mark and the return leg saw the boats in for lots of close hauls and tacking with the wind frequently now on the nose. Felspar took the lead close to Buckenham and gained good distance up to Rockland long dyke. Millchic having recovered from dropping back through the fleet after their earlier good start now pressing Bluey who was still in third place. Diamond Lil suddenly found a strong 'lift' to surge ahead through the fleet into third place for a short time. Opting to take position in the middle of the river, Kingfisher made good use of the north bank and regained the lead from Felspar to cross the line in first place. Bluey having regained third place was now pushing hard to catch *Felspar* before the finish line. At the line just half a boat length separated the two boats, with *Felspar* managing to hang on to take second position.

Race 3 Local 2.

OOD's Debbi Jaffey, Chris Logue and Gary Corbett. Northly wind, 18mph with gusts up to 30mph. Again the strong wind put a few off sailing especially so early in the season along with the windchill.

Over the three morning races a long course was set with number 3 (starboard) buoy dropped well up river for the start direction, this is where the wind was strongest and plenty of gusts, the five boats, 4 Yeomans and Paul Parker taking out the Comet (solo), set off tacking upriver from the start, having turned it was a run and sails goosewinged downriver when it was more sheltered once you turned the bend at the start box, a reach to port buoy 1 with a close haul to starboard buoy 2 placed outside Herons Reach for two laps.

Race 1, *Diamond Lil* made a good start which was retained to the finish, helmed by John Wells with Sandy Watt and Jane Yates. Paul Parker sailing the Club Comet took a gust in lap two moving quickly to the side of the boat which he righted and generally kept dry, retiring from this race. For races 2 & 3 Paul wisely put a reef in the sail, further gusts tried to topple him in but using his experience kept a float.

Race two was similar with *Felspar* the boat first over the line maintaining and keeping the lead to take first, helmed by Ben Adams with Judith Robertson and Crispin Lambert.

Race 3 *Diamond Lil* again made a good start which was maintained for lap one, overtaken by *Kingfisher* who was making good ground until it's jib became detached from the sheets, causing retirement, *Diamond Lil* again taking First over the line for Johns second win of the day.

All crews being happy to return to base after a full on mornings enjoyable sail.

WHERRY 'MAUD', 125years celebrations.

One of the icons of the Broads marks its century and a quarter birthday this year. 2024 sees the start of the celebrations for the 125th anniversary of the historic Norfolk trading Wherry, "**Maud**", being built and the 25th anniversary of her restoration by Vince and Linda Pargeter.

"Maud" is a very special Wherry; she is the last of the typical clinker-built trading wherries and one of the last two surviving trading wherries (Black Sail Traders) still sailing today. It is with thanks to the Wherry Maud Trust that this old lady can be regularly spotted sailing past the club or moored at Hardley Mill.

To celebrate this anniversary the Wherry Maud Trust is holding an Artists & Makers Show, as a major fundraiser to help the cost of ongoing maintenance of "Maud". The event will showcase the work of East Anglian artists and craftspeople Hanging work will be on display in various media – watercolour, oil, acrylic and prints. Other items for sale will include wood-turned pieces, studio pottery and textiles. <u>www.wherrymaudtrust.org</u>

"Maud" will also be moored at the Broadland Conservation Centre at Ranworth (Norfolk Wildlife Trust) and open for viewing. Admission is free.





Suggestions and Requests for CHSC paddling activities

We'd love to hear your thoughts and suggestions for paddling activities.

We plan to arrange some Club paddles on other days, hopefully including a couple of longer paddles to include a picnic and possibly some excursions to other locations, perhaps a coastal paddle if people are interested. Perhaps you'd like a skills or paddle safety awareness session to be organised, maybe you'd be interested in paddle racing.

Please let us know and we'll be pleased to look into the options.

Helpful tips, keeping safe and Broads Licence requirements

We recommend taking a look at the brilliant 'Paddlers Code' website endorsed by the Broads Authority and Paddle UK <u>The Paddlers Code | Respect, Protect, Enjoy.</u>

We've outlined some helpful safety tips below:

- Check your craft for damage every time before you put into the water, and keep an emergency repair kit with you if using an inflatable craft.
- Ensure you wear a buoyancy aid when near or on the water.
- > Check you have all the equipment you might need for the activity you are planning.
- > In a canoe or kayak, think about taking air bags or floatation devices.
- > Have you got the right clothing with you for the conditions of the day? Have you got lights if it might get dark?
- Consider any other items you might need, such as drinking water and energy snacks, suncream and a travel first aid kit, and a map or navigation device if you are going somewhere new a dry bag is a useful item of kit to keep these essentials in on the water.
- > Taking your mobile phone in a waterproof pouch is recommended.
- Ensure that you are aware of self-rescue techniques, and that you have practised these in a safe environment with other people before going paddling alone.

Licences

Paddle craft used on the River Yare and the Broads <u>must</u> have an **annual or short visit toll**, more information is available on the Broads Authority website <u>Annual</u> <u>toll (broads-authority.gov.uk)</u>.

Alternatively Paddle UK membership (previously British Canoeing) covers licence requirements for most UK waterways including the Broads and has other benefits such as insurance.
